


## Mission

#### **2012 YEAR AT A GLANCE**

Hunger is a global problem faced by 870 million people around the world.

> Chronic hunger and malnutrition not only endanger the health and survival of a population, but also stunt the growth of children, weaken the fabric of communities and perpetuate the cycle of hunger and poverty.

> The United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) is the largest humanitarian agency fighting hunger worldwide . WFP provides food assistance to save lives in refugee and other emergency situations, and to promote the self-reliance of poor people and communities.

World Food Program USA believes that hunger is the world's greatest solvable problem and that Americans can create real impact in improving global food security. In 2012, WFP USA granted \$18 million to WFP, investing the donations of supporters in programs that nourish communities worldwide.

This critical funding contributed to WFP delivering food assistance to over 97 million people in 80 countries. Nearly all who were served—82 million—were women and children, who are most at-risk in times of crisis.


When drought and conflict threatened the Sahel Region of Africa, early action by WFP and the international community helped to prevent a famine in the region. Globally, in 2012, WFP reached millions of people whose lives were severely affected by emergencies, including 6.5 million internally displaced people and 2.4 million refugees who crossed borders to flee dangers in their home countries.

To break the cycle of hunger, WFP works to strengthen the food security of vulnerable people. In 2012, 24.7 million children benefited from school meals that helped them grow up healthy and stay in school. Another 9.8 million malnourished children and 2.9 million women received special nutritional support. More than ever. WFP also works with small-scale farmers and local communities to help fuel innovation and build safety nets.

#### WFP IN ACTION

#### **DONOR SPOTLIGHT:**

As malnutrition reached emergency levels across the Sahel region of West Africa in 2012, **UPS** sprang into action to provide shipments of life-saving supplies to thousands of Malian refugees who had fled into Mauritania. Without these generous contributions from UPS, WFP-Mauritania would not have been able to store and pre-position the 6,000 metric tons of food that was needed before the rainy season began.

#### PREVENTING A FAMINE IN THE **AFRICAN SAHEL**

The Sahel is a semi-arid grassland that stretches across West Africa along the Southern border of the Sahara desert. The region is home to millions of people. Families living in this ecological zone depend on seasonal rains to water crops and raise livestock. These lands are particularly vulnerable to drought, which cause crops to wither, market prices to rise and malnutrition to reach a dangerous level.



In early 2012, a devastating drought pushed the Sahel close to the brink of disaster. Early action by the international community prevented the crisis from escalating and helped to avert a famine in the region.

As a result of early warning systems, WFP began to pre-position food stocks in the area. Early warning systems alerted the international community and a timely response from donors helped WFP to stem the crisis. One such system, the Famine Early Warning Systems Network (also known as FEWS NET)—a U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) funded effort that brings together NASA, USAID and other U.S. agencies—uses a broad range of food security indicators, including weather data and market trends to forecast which populations are most vulnerable to hunger.

In 2012, WFP reached over 10 million people in collaboration with governments and partners in eight countries: Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Chad, Mali, Mauritania, Niger, Senegal and The Gambia.

Emergency assistance included stocking local cereal banks, providing food vouchers to help bolster local markets and distributing specialized nutritional products. To prevent a spike in malnutrition, WFP targeted special nutritional support to at-risk mothers and young children and ramped up school feeding. Long-term food security efforts in the Sahel focus on building communities' ability to weather crisis by training farmers, providing cash-for-work and connecting communities to reliable food sources.

WFP is also working to build the food security and resilience of other parts of the continent, including in the Horn of Africa, where recovery efforts are still underway after 2011's widespread drought.



#### WHAT IS A FAMINE?

Famine is an emergency status that is declared when basic measures of food security hit a dangerous threshold, as measured by the prevalence of hunger, percentage of malnourished children and daily mortality rates of a population. The drivers that cause famine can

be natural as well as political. Today, most food emergencies do not have to escalate to the level of famine. Early action, combined with the generosity of governments, as well as individual, corporate and foundation donors, can effectively stop a famine before it starts.



#### THE MIDDLE EAST: **SYRIANS FLEE CIVIL WAR**

In the aftermath of the Arab Spring uprisings, parts of the region remain politically unstable, impacting the economic and social welfare of millions. In Syria, a humanitarian crisis has developed amid worsening violence. Families fleeing conflict often name the lack of food as one of their most pressing needs. In addition to the threat of violence and homelessness, bread and fuel shortages have pushed many to the breaking point.



WFP has provided food assistance in Syria since the crisis began in late 2012, providing direct emergency relief. As of September 2013, WFP had distributed food to 3 million Syrians caught in the crossfire and to more than 1 million refugees who have poured into neighboring countries. WFP staff work day and night to reach families in crisis, but needs on the ground continue to grow with each passing day.

#### **HOW WFP WORKS TO SOLVE GLOBAL HUNGER**

WFP works to improve global food security through a comprehensive strategy that addresses the immediate needs and underlying causes of hunger, including:



#### **EMERGENCY FOOD RELIEF**

Emergency food relief is essential for meeting basic human needs in the wake of natural disasters, conflict and humanitarian crises. By working closely with governments, local partners and the international community, WFP is able to quickly deploy emergency assistance to those in need.



#### **NUTRITION FOR WOMEN AND CHILDREN**

Malnutrition early in a child's life causes irreversible damage and contributes to the death of more than 3.5 million children every year in developing countries. WFP provides nutritional support to women and young children during the most critical window of a child's development—the first 1,000 days, from pregnancy of the mother to age two of the child's life.



#### **SUPPORT FOR SMALL-SCALE FARMERS**

Half of the world's hungry are small-scale farmers, most of whom are women. In 2008 WFP piloted the Purchase for Progress (P4P) program, designed to address this issue. The Program works to improve the food security of local communities by helping small-scale farmers access markets, providing agricultural training and offering food in exchange for work on local development projects.

#### **SCHOOL MEALS**

School meals have the power to break the cycle of poverty, by giving children the chance to learn, grow and reach their full potential. Just 25 cents provides a nutritious meal for a child in need. School meals give families an incentive to send children to school, particularly girls, who often receive no education. WFP is one of the world's largest providers of school meals, and in 2012 provided 24.7 million children in 60 countries with a nutritious meal.



#### **INVESTING IN INNOVATIVE SOLUTIONS**

WFP USA supports these efforts through funding for innovative programs that purchase food locally.

#### FIRST 1,000 DAYS

It is an exciting time for maternal and child health as political will and donor support continue to build for investing in moms and babies. Malnutrition during early childhood can cause irreversible damage, but international consensus has identified a set of interventions that bolster healthy development during those critical first 1,000 days—the window of a mother's pregnancy through the child's second birthday—including practices such as exclusive breastfeeding for the first six months. To prevent malnutrition in women and children during emergencies and in areas of high food insecurity, WFP provides support through specialized foods.







#### **FOOD VOUCHERS**

In emergencies, WFP works to get food to hungry people as quickly as possible. Where there are food shortages, WFP imports food stocks. But if there are markets nearby to feed people, it is often quicker and less expensive to purchase food locally. In particular, WFP has had success with cash and voucher programs that provide refugees immediate access to healthy, nutritious food such as fruits, vegetables and proteins. WFP cash and voucher programs assisted 6 million people in 2012.

#### **PURCHASE FOR PROGRESS**

Purchase for Progress (P4P) is an innovative partnership made possible by the Howard G. Buffett Foundation and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to drive small-scale agricultural growth in 20 of the world's poorest countries. The five-year pilot project harnesses WFP's purchasing power to link small-scale farmers to agricultural training and reliable markets for their crops. Since P4P's launch in 2008, WFP has purchased food from farmers and farmers' organizations representing more than 1 million farmers.

#### **SAFE STOVES**

In many parts of the world, most of the cooking is done indoors over an open fire, creating a number of health and safety risks. WFP provides clean cook stoves to families through its Safe Access to Firewood and Alternative Energy (SAFE) initiative. SAFE stoves burn more cleanly and efficiently, reducing health risks and environmental impact. They also reduce the risk of violence by preventing the need for women to venture into unsafe areas where they can be left vulnerable to rape and other attacks.

#### **SAFE STOVES IN DARFUR**

In Darfur, WFP trains women to build safer cook stoves and sell fuel briquettes as an income-generating business to help them raise their families out of hunger and poverty. SAFE stoves are also being used to prepare school meals for thousands of children.





#### **MOBILIZING PARTNERS TO SOLVE HUNGER**

WFP USA connects American organizations, businesses and philanthropists with opportunities to transform the lives of hungry people around the world. We work closely with partners to identify innovative ways they can invest in making a difference.

#### **GOVERNMENT OF GUATEMALA**

WFP USA brought together the government of Guatemala with private sector donors to develop a plan for tackling the country's startling childhood malnutrition rate, one of the highest in the world. The Guatemala 1,000 Days Initiative was announced at the Clinton Global Initiative in September 2012 by President Bill Clinton and President Molina Perez of Guatemala. The government committed more than \$150 million over 3 years to fund the initiative, including \$15 million to WFP-Guatemala to provide special nutritional support to pregnant women and young children during the first 1,000 days window of the mother's pregnancy up to the child's second birthday.

#### **GLOBAL CITIZEN FESTIVAL**

As part of United Nations Week in September 2012, WFP USA joined the Global Citizen Festival as a primary partner of the star-studded benefit concert, which challenged the American public to help end extreme poverty. To earn tickets, the Festival asked online audiences to speak up for global hunger relief. During the televised broadcast, WFP USA President and CEO Rick Leach announced on stage the organization's commitment to fighting childhood malnutrition in Central America to the largest concert viewing audience in history.

#### **BLOOMBERG**

For several years, Bloomberg has rallied employees to support global hunger relief around World Food Day, which is held annually on October 16th, by closing their food courts for the day and donating the funds saved to WFP USA. In 2012, Bloomberg transformed their NYC office space with engaging multimedia displays about global hunger and a FEED pop-up shop. During the month of October, they matched all employee donations in the U.S. and Europe for two weeks. Their comprehensive approach to engaging their employees has helped to raise awareness for global hunger and provide funds for essential WFP programs such as school meals.

#### **INTERNATIONAL PAPER**

Almost a decade ago, International Paper (IP) partnered with WFP USA to launch Coins 4 Kids™, an employee-based giving program to feed hungry children in the slums of Nairobi, Kenya. A Coins 4 Kids cup filled with change can feed a child for an entire school year. Nutritious school meals help children grow up strong, stay in school and break the cycle of hunger and poverty. In total, IP raised over \$6.5 million—that's 26 million WFP school meals for children in Kenya. WFP USA and IP expanded Coins 4 Kids into a volunteer initiative designed to engage companies, schools and communities.

#### **CATERPILLAR FOUNDATION**

This year, with the generous support of the Caterpillar Foundation, WFP delivered school meals to more than 2.6 million at-risk children in eight African countries: Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Rwanda, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia. These are some of the most vulnerable children in the world, many of whom are battling extreme poverty, living in sprawling slums, or have been orphaned by disease. Caterpillar's generous investment included a \$3 million pledge, to be disbursed over three years, as well as an equipment grant targeted at providing \$5 million in equipment over five years.

#### **CARGILL**

For over a decade, Cargill has proven to be a tremendous partner to WFP. Cargill's support enables WFP to lay the groundwork for a more food secure future by investing in sustainable efforts to solve global hunger. In 2012, Cargill committed generous support for school meals for hungry children in Bolivia. In a country where school attendance is low, the promise of at least one nutritious meal each day boosts enrollment, promotes regular school attendance and provides children with vital nourishment. Cargill also generously sponsored WFP USA's 11th Annual George McGovern Leadership Award Ceremony.

#### **UPS FOUNDATION**

The ongoing commitment of the UPS Foundation helps WFP continuously improve its logistics and emergency response capabilities. Through this partnership, WFP has made critical improvements to its crisis operations that benefit millions of disaster victims around the world. As malnutrition reached emergency levels across the Sahel region of West Africa in 2012, UPS sprang to action to provide shipments of life-saving supplies to thousands of Malian refugees who had fled into Mauritania. UPS also sponsored WFP USA's 11th Annual George McGovern Leadership Award Ceremony.

#### **ASTELLAS USA FOUNDATION**

In 2012, the Astellas USA Foundation supported WFP's maternal and child health and nutrition programs in the Sahel region of West Africa, one of the most food-insecure areas in the world. The scale of WFP's nutrition response during the 2012 Sahel crisis was unprecedented, providing critical support to a greater number of women and children across a wider geographical area than ever before. In Niger, one of the hardest hit countries, the grant from the Astellas USA Foundation provided vital micronutrient supplements for more than 7,600 children at feeding centers throughout the country.

#### **SHAPING U.S. POLICY**

In Washington DC, WFP USA works to solve global hunger, by working closely with the U.S. government to help ensure that Congressional funding for global food assistance remains strong.



#### ROADMAP FOR CONTINUED U.S. LEADERSHIP TO END GLOBAL HUNGER

In July 2012, WFP USA gathered members of Congress and leaders from NGO, advocacy and faith-based organizations on Capitol Hill to launch the Roadmap for Continued U.S. Leadership to End Global Hunger.

The updated Roadmap—which is supported by an unprecedented coalition of 51 organizations—outlines a comprehensive strategy to continue improving the effectiveness of U.S. global food security programs, building upon groundwork laid by the Roadmap to End Global Hunger launched in 2009. WFP USA meets regularly with a coalition of 10 other originating organizations to evaluate progress on the first Roadmap and develop key recommendations for U.S. policymakers going forward.

Together, the Roadmap coalition is calling for six core recommendations:

- Appoint a cross-agency focal point to coordinate U.S. global food security programs
- Increase support for programs that build resilience to shocks
- 3 Strengthen community safety net programs
- 4 Institutionalize the focus on nutrition
- Support country-led development
- Sustain and increase investment in food security programs



#### **BREAKING THE CYCLE OF HUNGER IN THE SAHEL**

In October 2012, WFP USA hosted a high-level event calling for increased coordination among the international community to address food and nutrition security in one of the world's most vulnerable areas—the African Sahel. Held during the World Food Prize

ceremonies in Des Moines, lowa, the event drew officials from WFP, USAID and the Chicago Council on Global Affairs to discuss how investing in small-scale farmers and community safety nets can help build food security and resilience in the Sahel.

#### **CAPITOL HILL**

The United States has demonstrated a longstanding and bipartisan commitment to alleviating world hunger. Congressional support is vital to maintaining that commitment. WFP USA works closely with Congress through public education efforts and meetings with Members and Congressional staff to promote good policy and strong funding levels for US international food assistance programs.

In 2012, a major revision of the Farm bill was considered by Congress. Within the Farm Bill, the Food for Peace Act authorizes emergency relief and food assistance to millions of people suffering from hunger and malnutrition around the globe.

For the past 50 years, it has been the primary vehicle for the U.S. to respond to emergency food needs caused by natural disasters, crises and conflicts. It also authorizes the McGovern-Dole school meals program that feeds many of the world's poorest children. WFP USA worked closely with key Congressional committees, members and staff to shape a Farm Bill that provide for effective,

efficient and flexible programs to reach vulnerable communities around the world. The full Congress has not yet passed an updated Farm Bill, but the current Senate version of the bill reflects many of the changes and additions advocated by WFP USA and its non-governmental organization advocacy partners.

The other major area of WFP USA's work with Congress in 2012 was to encourage robust US funding for the most important agricultural and foreign assistance accounts that provide US contributions to international food assistance programs. The success of WFP USA efforts can be seen in the fact that, despite difficult budget times in the US, Congress provided sufficient funding for US food assistance programs to allow the US Government to increase significantly its 2012 annual contributions to the UN World Food Programme. US Government contributions to WFP in 2012 totaled \$1.462 billion, an increase of more than \$200 million over the 2011 total of \$1.239 billion.

# THE HONORABLE GEORGE MCGOVERN JULY 19, 1922 – OCTOBER 21, 2012


This year, the world lost a legend in the field of global humanitarian work. The Honorable George McGovern is regarded by many as the founding father of the United Nations World Food Programme. A lifelong anti-hunger advocate, the late Senator helped craft many of the United States' flagship food security programs—from food stamps at home to Food for Peace overseas. World Food Program USA is proud to honor the memory and legacy of our long-time board member and friend. George McGovern's work has fed millions of people around the world, from those suffering food shortages in the aftermath of war and natural disaster to the chronically hungry and dispossessed.

McGovern served under President John F. Kennedy as the first director of the U.S. Food for Peace Program. As a Senator, he served on the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Nutrition and the Foreign Relations Committee. He was appointed ambassador to the UN Food and Agriculture Organization in Rome by President Bill Clinton, and in 2001 the UN named him the first global ambassador on hunger.

In 2002, McGovern collaborated with Senator Bob school meals program, which today feeds approximately 5 million children worldwide. In honor of McGovern's lifetime of leadership, each year WFP USA presents the Annual George McGovern Leadership Award to individuals who have made outstanding contributions toward solving hunger. WFP USA helped George McGovern celebrate his 90th birthday in July 2012, with a reception at the Newseum in Washington DC. The event was attended by many U.S. and Congressional leaders who shared tributes and reflections on his selfless efforts to serve. By every measure, George McGovern was an extraordinary man with a big heart. We thank him for his tremendous impact globally upon the lives of millions and remain committed to carrying on his legacy through our work.



#### **GEORGE MCGOVERN LEADERSHIP AWARD**

The George McGovern Leadership Award recognizes leaders who have made significant contributions toward efforts to solve global hunger. In 2012, WFP USA awarded the honor to David Novak, Chairman and CEO of Yum! Brands, and Christina Aguilera, WFP Ambassador Against Hunger, during its 11th Annual Awards Ceremony at the U.S. Department of State.

Novak and Aguilera were honored for the tremendous difference they have made in the lives of hungry children worldwide. Novak leads Yum! Brands' World Hunger Relief effort; and Christina Aguilera serves as its spokesperson. The world's largest private-sector hunger relief initiative, it is operated through Yum!'s 38,000 KFC, Pizza Hut and Taco Bell restaurants in more than 120 countries. To date the effort has raised \$115 million for WFP and other partners, providing 460 million meals to hungry children around the globe.

During the event WFP USA paid special tribute to Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, who received the McGovern Award in 2010, for her unprecedented commitment to improving global food security. Under Secretary Clinton's leadership, the United States has been a global force in tackling malnutrition and hunger through the 1,000 Days partnership and the U.S. Feed the Future initiative, which helps develop the agricultural sector of partner countries to improve nutrition and drive economic growth.


